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
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
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


Look! The sea is filled with ikan todak!

When there were no signs of any *Ikan* todak, we quickly lined rows of banana stems along the seashore to protect us.






Soon, the *Ikan todak* started attacking! When they leapt out of the water however, their bills got stuck in the banana stems. We were finally able to defeat the fishes!



We ended the day by celebrating the victory with a big feast and everyone sang a grateful toast to me!


